The Pastor's Pen


Greetings! It is so good for me to write "Happy Spring!" Enjoy these days of springtime. In a few weeks, we will be celebrating Easter. Even when Easter comes early in the spring, it is seen as "new life" coming off winter. Flowers are blooming, trees are budding, and birds are busy at work. Easter is our celebration of the resurrection of Jesus from the grave. Jesus' new life affirms our new life in him. We are "Easter" people. For us, death does not have the last word. Our hope is in Jesus who conquered death on a cross.

I want to personally invite you to enjoy the choir cantata *Requiem* on Palm/ Passion Sunday (April 13th), to attend our Last Supper drama on Maundy Thursday (April 17th), to Walk with Jesus and worship at the Tenebrae service on Good Friday (April 18th), and to celebrate our risen Lord on Easter Sunday (April 20th). (See page 2 of this newsletter for times, locations, and descriptions of these events.) These special services and activities are designed to help you get closer to the Lord. We can best enjoy Easter when we experience what Jesus went through during his last weeks. Jesus' resurrection first meant that he died on a cross for all of us, and God did not keep him in the grave.

A lot of people over a long time have tried to ignore the cross. But we can't! The cross is an emblem of suffering and shame. But the cross is also a sign of hope. The cross connects us to eternity. The cross is the bridge by which we can get closer to

God. Jesus' death on the cross was because we sin, mess-up, and fall short; his resurrection is our new life. That is why Easter is so very important. Jesus' Easter is now our Easter. Celebrate that!

In May, we will be preaching from John 14. This is the second of three scriptures our Church Council wanted



the church to study. Also, on Wednesdays in May, I will lead a study of the Psalms from May 7th to May 28th. Please join me at 6:30 pm in the Disciple Room, just off Ascension Hall. I'm also excited about the formation of a Visitation Team. We have 14 persons who are regularly visiting those who have been unable to attend church due to health reasons. Our newly formed Communications Team has redesigned our website (Kudos to them!), & the team formed to discover our Core Values is very close to presenting them to the congregation. A Vision Team will begin working this month to study our church and examine our needs and strengths in order to make recommendations to the Church Council.

Christ Church is not here simply to maintain what has been. We want to be obedient to what God is asking us to be and do. It pleases me greatly to be a part of God's work here.




EASTER LILIES

Walk with Jesus through a powerful, interactive, & multisensory event starting at 4:30 pm on Good Friday, April 18 in the church office building at 105 Market Street. Families will journey through five stations, following Jesus' footsteps during his last days on earth. We will travel to Jerusalem for Palm Sunday, sit down for the Last Supper, pray in the Garden of Gethsemane, re-discover the sacrifice of Good Friday, and celebrate Jesus' resurrection at the empty tomb.

While designed specifically for parents/caregivers and their elementary age children, this activity is open to all ages and will help you discover the events leading up to Easter in

a way you'll never forget. You will feel, hear, see, smell, and even taste some of what Jesus experienced! Please come anytime between 4:30 to 6:30 pm, and plan to spend about 45 minutes. Holy Week FAQs



1. Why is Easter on a different day each year?

In 325 AD, the Council of Nicea set the date for the celebration of Easter as the first Sunday after the first full moon following the spring equinox. For this reason, the date will change each year and can fall anywhere from March 22 to April 25.

2. What is Maundy Thursday? Maundy Thursday is an alternate name for Holy Thursday, the first of the three days of solemn

remembrance of the events leading up to and immediately following the crucifixion of Jesus. The English word "Maundy" comes from the Latin "mandatum", which means "commandment". As recorded in John's gospel, on his last night before his betrayal and arrest, Jesus washed the feet of his disciples and then gave them a new commandment to love one another as he had loved them (John 13:34). This is why services on this night generally include the washing of feet or other acts of physical care as an integral part of the celebration. While John's gospel does not record the institution of the Lord's Supper among the events of this night, the other gospels do. Christians therefore keep this night with celebrations both at the basin (foot washing) & the Lord's Table (Holy Communion).

3. What is Tenebrae service? The word "tenebrae" comes from the Latin meaning "darkness". The Tenebrae is an ancient Christian Good Friday service that makes use of gradually diminishing light through the extinguishing of candles to symbolize the events of that week from the triumphant Palm Sunday entry through Jesus' burial. This increasing darkness symbolizes the approaching darkness of Jesus' death & of hopelessness in the world without God. The service concludes in darkness, sometimes with a final candle, the Christ candle, carried out of the sanctuary, symbolizing the death of Jesus. A loud noise may also sound symbolizing the closing of Jesus' tomb. Worshipers then leave in silence to ponder the impact of Christ's death and await the coming Resurrection.

Why does the Last Supper Really Matter?

Have you ever just wanted to say, "I've had it! I'm done . . . for the day, the week, the month, forever!"? In the following article, Whitney Daughtery, who blogs for Good Morning Girls (www.goodmorninggirls.org/) shares honestly about the sacrifices we make as parents, friends, sons/daughters, employees, and church members . . . and how all of those – no matter how grand - pale in comparison to the sacrifice Jesus made for us.

I had had it. I was done with a capital D. So much so that I even let the words slip out of my mouth in frustration to one of my kids. It had been one of those weeks. One very sick little girl had spent three full nights awake with a high fever, who was kept company by a brother who kept waking up claiming that he "just couldn't sleep" (which I'm sure was legit, but oh.my.goodness). Another was seriously trying my patience in the obedience department, and the fourth sweet child just wanted me to listen for hours on end to the long list of inventions (mostly involving jet propulsion and duct tape) that had been forming in that brain of his that never stops.

Jesus help me. I signed up for this, I know full well. And I am blessed beyond measure to be sure. And truly, all these years later, I expect the unexpected & the sacrifice that comes with kids. I really do. Oh, I know it in my head, but when my flesh and my heart are weak, Jesus help me. In my flesh, I'm not naturally built to handle this kind of sleep deprivation on a regular basis and still practice any resemblance of patience at the end of a long day. (See "Sacrifice", p. 4)

Looking Forward . . . to the Season of Easter

At our weakest moments, if we're completely honest, I'm guessing that we've all been here about *something* at *some* point in our lives. **Deep down in our core, we're just plain tired of the sacrifice.** Maybe you're the honest, loyal employee who fails to get recognized while others cheat their way to the top. Maybe you're the church worker who has faithfully, quietly served behind the scenes without an accolade in years. Maybe you're the caregiver who provides selflessly, or the patient who fights endlessly. Or maybe you're the *friend, daughter, sister, wife, mom...* who always seems to be on the giving end, but rarely on the receiving one. *Maybe*, you're just really, really trying to live for Jesus, and the *giving up* of the things of this world seems like an overwhelming price to pay.

The world and a thousand self-help books will tell you to quit. That the sacrifice is too much. That you should look out for you. But Jesus came with a counter-cultural message that would change the world. And He didn't just preach it. He actually lived it.

He served in the suffering... When Jesus gathered with His disciples at the Last Supper, He had every right to demand to be treated like their King. His body was surely tired from some of his last grueling days of ministry on earth. He had selflessly served – over and over feeding the poor and healing the sick - yet the Jews continued in their unbelief that Jesus really was the Messiah, even after witnessing miracle after miracle. This *man of sacrifice* served *even* with the knowledge that some of his closest followers would soon betray and deny Him.

No other King in history has given more and received less. But then again, He wasn't just any other King... And if that all wasn't enough, in the midst of His serving, He carried the heavy weight of His imminent death.

And He could have cried out, "Father, I'm done. The sacrifice is too great." But instead, he put Himself aside, and He humbly stooped down to wash the feet of sinners. Please don't let the repetition of this story or the simplicity of this act distract you from the profound mystery that is Christ. Instead of wallowing in the dark days which were upon Him, Jesus demonstrated that he came not to be served, but to serve (Matthew 20:28). He would even kneel down and serve the very one who was about to hand Him over to be killed. That is unthinkable in human terms. It was far from a job fit for the King of Kings, but it was a profound example of how those of us who are in Christ should live our lives.

You see, in Christ, everything looks different. Those sleepless nights, and those hard days when I feel like I'm just plain tired of the sacrifice? It all looks different because of Jesus. And with His strength, I can serve instead of seeking to be served. I can sacrifice even in the midst of suffering, and I don't have to wait until I'm appreciated or in a good season to reciprocate love, encouragement, and generosity to others. I can humble myself and not expect earthly recognition, knowing that it is far better to treasure Christ.

Why does the Last Supper matter? Because it begs us to take our eyes off of ourselves, and to NEVER FORGET the willing sacrifice that Jesus made for you and for me. And when we really remember deep down to our core, then we can say... No sacrifice is too great. Father, not my will, but Yours be done...

"Now that I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also should wash one another's feet. I have set you an example that you should do as I have done for you." $\sim 10hn \ 13:14-15$


Durham Bulls Fans! Don't Miss This!




