Greetings! This is a very interesting time and season for Christians. We certainly must live in the world, but how do we live in ways that are not of the world? I am learning that the Biblical teachings on Advent, Christmas, and new beginnings can be very helpful. So, how do we approach our Christian faith and enjoy December and the first of January? Can we keep our focus on Jesus while the world teaches us instant access and immediate gratification?

My friends, we do not have to be distracted by the goings on of December or become disheartened by the worldliness of this season. In his sermon on November 30th, our Duke intern, Brent Levy, reminded us that God does his best work when life seems most dark. The Spiritual Lessons of the Christmas Crèche

Nativity scenes are a common sight during Advent and Christmas, but, if you look closer, what seems like a simple decoration actually carries a lot of spiritual lessons. In 1223, St. Francis of Assisi created the first crèche in an attempt to bring the focus of Christmas back to the birth of Christ and away from material, gift-giving customs. The history, customs, and meaning behind variations in crèche displays has always interested Jean Honeycutt, a member of First UMC in Tullahoma, TN. Her church houses a permanent Nativity museum which includes over

400 crèches. So, what do you know about the symbols in your nativity scene? Jean explains some of them below.

- ⇒ Baby Jesus' outstretched arms reflect the invitation to salvation through him.
- ⇒ Baby Jesus' swaddling clothes foretell Jesus' burial shroud.
- ⇒ The Virgin Mary's gown of red signifies lifeblood, and her mantle of blue repre-



sents the sky and heaven, conveying that she is the link between the human and the divine.

⇒ Mary's hands over her heart allude to Luke's account: "But Mary kept all these things and pondered them in her heart" (Luke 2:19).



⇒ **The Shepherds** represent the common man and also reference David, the shepherd who became king, and indicate Christ's ancestral lineage.

⇒ **The Magi** are often depicted as being three different ages (young, middle-aged, and elderly) relating to the three stages of life. Sometimes, they also represent three different cultural and geographical areas – Asia, Africa, and Europe – the three known continents at the time.

Give of Yourself this Christmas and in 2015



One Friday afternoon during my first year at Duke Divinity School, when the pressures of papers and piety and preceptorial sessions peaked and became nearly unbearable, I found my way to a basement classroom

affectionately called "The Dungeon." Meeting in "the Dungeon" that day was a group of 7 to 10 students who had invited me to be a part of Duke Divinity's esteemed, world-famous improv comedy troupe. I loved watching "Whose Line is it Anyway" growing up and had always wanted to give improv a shot, so that Friday afternoon, I jumped in ... and I loved every second.

I loved it so much that my wife Natalie let me take improv classes for 10 weeks that summer in Carrboro, where I learned the fundamentals of improvisational comedy. It was an incredible way to spend a summer after a grueling first year. It was just what I needed.

The first thing they teach in improv class – the most basic lesson – is the "**Yes**, and." The idea is that when you're in a scene with your partner and your partner has an idea, you don't shut it down to make way for your own idea. Instead, you "Yes, and." It's a way of saying, "Yes... that's a great idea, and... here's what could make it better." "Yes, and"-ing takes the scene to the next level. Each idea builds on the last. When the scene starts, the players have no idea where they're going. They have no idea where their "Yes, and"-ing will take them. But the exciting part is that where they go **together** ends up being so much better (and so much more fun!) than if they decided to go it alone.

I wonder what it would look like if we did this in real life. How might this change our relationships with one another? Where might we go together? Or what if we imagined our lives as the biggest improv scene ever with God as our improv partner? Perhaps our "Yes, and" would lead us into a new friendship with the barista or the chance to feed God's beloved by gleaning sweet potatoes. Or maybe a "Yes, and" will compel you to speak out against an injustice or operate from a place of love rather than fear. I don't know, but I think it just might be worth a shot. CUMC has supported Chatham Habitat for Humanity since 2009 by participating in the Habitat Apostles Build program. Up to 12 local churches (i.e., the twelve apostles) contribute funds and volunteer labor to help construct one or two homes per year. CUMC also contributed in the past to the Habitat home rehabilitation program in Siler City.

As we look back over 2014, we are thankful God used us to contribute \$5000 as well as the manpower &



womanpower needed to construct a house for the Johnston family and other Chatham County families who have long dreamed of owning a home. Looking ahead to 2015, Habitat has purchased 28 acres of land in Pittsboro (off Old 64 East behind the Piggly Wiggly) where future houses will be built. Did you know that **50%** of public school children in Chatham County receive free or low cost meals (breakfast and lunch) through the federal school lunch program because their family income is at or near poverty level? That's 4,352 children who will likely not have adequate replacements for these meals when school ends in 6 months. It's a very difficult struggle for their families to provide for them over the 10-week summer break.

That's where SNACK (Summer Nutritional Assistance for Chatham Kids) & YOU come in. SNACK fills the gap by providing food boxes to eligible families each week. Food programs in other counties require families to find their own transportation to given locations for meals, but that's a difficult task in rural Chatham County with no public transportation. So, SNACK

provides food boxes at designated neighborhood sites. Last summer, CUMC members Jamie & Rick Skinner distributed food from Nature Trail Mobile Home Park near Carolina Meadows.

In the spring, 2015, Christ Church members plan to organize a food drive. It costs \$15 to feed a child for a week and \$150 for the entire summer. Won't you say "Yes, and" to this opportunity to show Christ's love to people in your community? Don't just *write* a check; *serve* with SNACK, too.
