## Graduation and the Christian Life



My niece graduated from high school last weekend, and all five of the commencement addresses our family listened to during the ceremony had one thing in common: the speakers all started with a quote or a definition. In keeping with this season of graduation (and the theme of this June newsletter), I, too, shall begin in this fashionable way. Webster's defines the noun graduate as a person who has successfully completed a course of study or training, especially a person who has been awarded an undergraduate academic degree. Most of us would agree the term "graduate" is most often associated with the academic arena. We celebrate graduates who have completed high school or college, for example. But does that always have to be the case? Could one be a "graduate" of church or the Christian life?

Donald Miller, the author of *Blue Like Jazz* and other books, seems to think so. He recently blogged that he had "graduated" from traditional church: "While I love the traditional church, I love it like a foundational part of my past, as though it were a University I've graduated from to join a much larger church those still in the University program are quite suspicious of." As you might imagine, this comment garnered quite a bit of attention in the Christian blog sphere. Trey Lyon, who oversees Urban Village Ministries which does community development in Atlanta, Georgia, wrote a response to Miller. He argued that, despite its flaws, being in church is not something from which we should "graduate":

See, I could say all I need is God and all I need to meet God is me and God and the great outdoors, but that's not completely true. The truth is we need other people. Yes, I know Donald Miller said he needs community and "small groups." The funny thing is I think he forgot that's what the church does. Oh, sure, there's a stage and some songs, and there's normally someone up there talking, and when we're honest it doesn't always click into something we can apply that day or even that week. But judging church on the worship experience alone is like an Olympic judge only grading an athlete on one move during a complex, intricate routine. So I don't know what kind of church it is Donald isn't attending. And I'm not entirely sure what kind of "church university" he has since graduated from. And ultimate-ly, I don't know him, so I'll have to go with what I know:

- I know that I am a child of God, but sometimes I need to be reminded of that.
- I know that sometimes I am a jerk, and sometimes I need to be reminded of that too.
- I know that God is at work in the world, and sometimes I need to tell someone else about that.
- I know that sometimes I think that even the idea of God is an insult to the pain others are feeling, and sometimes I need [Him to speak through] people to say "I know how you feel" and others to say "but look at how beautiful this is."
- I know that sometimes I am wrong, and no matter how many degrees I have, articles I write, or sermons I preach, I need someone to tell me that I'm wrong . . . and a tree can't do that.
- I know that, as Anne Lamott says, "The most powerful sermon in the world are the words <u>me too</u>," and I know I have never found more people to tell me that than I have found in church.
- I know that God is in the sunset, but I know sunsets are a lot better when they're shared. (www.abpnews.com)

I agree with Trey. I'm not going to graduate from church—ever—well, at least not until I get the ultimate promotion to heaven. I need the weekly "remediation" of worship so I can be open to hearing God's word for me, be reminded of His love for me, be ready to offer words of comfort and encouragement to others, & always be ready to praise Him.

## Core Values at Christ Church

Over the last five months, a subcommittee of the Church Council has been engaged in a process to answer these questions by defining and articulating the core values of our church family. Core values help define "what's important" to a person or organization. They guide our actions & behaviors and serve as a critical lens as we make decisions. They are our core beliefs – but not necessarily a doctrinal statement. They are our philosophy, principles, & ideals—not just words on paper—but something that should truly drive behavior & shape our culture. Christ Church's core values shape how we will deliver on our mission statement:

#### We gather in the name of Jesus Christ to worship God and to seek, nurture and send Christian disciples into the world.

We have always had core values at Christ Church; we just haven't gone through the exercise of articulating them. The process is now complete, and I'm excited to share the values with you:

Compassionate Love – Demonstrating God's mercy, grace, kindness and devotion to all Active Invitation – Going out of our way to engage and welcome
 Nourishing Community – Cultivating the ties that bind us to each other and our neighbors
 Abundant Generosity – Joyous giving through willing sacrifice and extraordinary sharing
 Purposeful Service – Using our gifts to unselfishly care for other

You can learn more about our core values by listening to a sermon entitled, *Working from Your Core*, which I shared with the congregation on June 1. ## Peace be with you, Pastor Christi



The Prayer Closet" is a new column which will appear in each issue of *The Connection*. Written by various members of The Shemaiah Group (formerly known as The Prayer Team), the goal of the articles will be to share helpful ideas about prayer, encourage you to pray often, and to let you know how God is answering prayer at CUMC. Shemaiah means "God Heard" in Hebrew ... & He still does!

On Saturday, April 28, a loose confederacy of women gathered for a Prayer Workshop at CUMC. In the first part of the session, Pastor David shared his ideas and plans for prayer at CUMC, ways the prayer team might assist at Sunday services and special events, and how to better inform the congregation about our activities. As he spoke, I began to imagine sharing my love of all things prayer with the church at large, but as I added more details to my happy musings, I began to imagine more things going wrong! As with many daydreams, my enthusiasm began to wane as I calculated the handful of women sitting around me, divided by the number of services on Sunday, & subtracted the percentages of "I'm out of town that week."

When I finished crunching the numbers, I didn't like the results. As exciting as it is to dream about possibilities becoming realities, I found myself thinking, "We are just too few for all this work." Suddenly, Pastor David interrupted my musings, calling my attention back to the discussion: "Prayer, no matter what kind, is an act of faith. Do you have enough faith? Ask yourself, how is your prayer life? If you don't know what God is up to, spend more time in listening prayer. Prayer at its best draws us into union with God." These few sentences have challenged me far more than the technical "bookkeeping" aspects of who slots where on Sunday mornings.

So, right about now I'm guessing you are probably thinking that the pitch to join the Shemaiah Group is coming. Well it's not . . . and not because you're not welcome *because you are*. But when I prayed about my concerns, when I talked to my Father in Heaven, he showed me a "new math". By adding my faith to the abundance of God's grace, a different reality began to emerge. The way I see it, you are already in the Shemaiah Group. Every place you go—wherever you are—the possibility for prayer goes with you. Every conversation you have is an opportunity for blessing. Every act of service you perform can be a prayer of gratitude to God. *You are someone's hope* (maybe his/her only hope) to bring intercession, praise and restoration. The fact is you, your faith, and the power of the Holy Spirit residing in you are a powerful prayer team.

Shortly after the prayer workshop, I received a thank you note from a participant. She wrote: "I am hopeful that I will be able to contribute to the efforts of the prayer team and to make prayer the central focus of my relationship to God. I also hope we are able to bring prayer to those who are in need but cannot ask for it, for whatever reason." That's my prayer, too, and I have one for you as well. It's called the Prayer of Realization, and you can find it in Ephesians 3:14-21. Why not open your Bible and pray it today?
