The Pastor's Pen

Fall is such an important time in the life of a church. Here at Christ UMC, we begin to have more people in worship, our Wednesday night fellowship, youth, and children's ministries are in full swing, music groups for all ages are practicing, and even more activities are planned! In October, a mission team will travel to Russia, we'll begin building a Habitat Home, and we'll glean for sweet potatoes. At the same time, we will begin to look at funding next year's ministries and ways we can achieve our goals for those ministries. *Growth and engagement* are two important goals for 2015. We want to grow in all aspects of church life, and we desire that all the people here are engaged in some form of ministry beyond worship. However, saying that we want this to happen will not make it so. We need God's help and guidance.

I am starting my second year as your pastor, and I am so hopeful and thankful. Here at CUMC, God has a lot of resources from which to work. We will continue to ask God, "What do you want us to do?", & we will listen for & discern His responses.

I would like to write about the financial support needed for ministry. To finish the year well, we need everyone who pledged to *complete*, and if possible, *exceed* your commitment. For the 200 giving families who did not pledge, we need you to step up and give as you have in the past; likewise, if you can give more, that will help us meet our obligations. If we maintain our present level of giving into next year, we

will not be able to ask the Bishop for a full-time Associate Pastor starting in July, 2015. Without your support, we will be restrained in funding creative ways of reaching populations of the un-churched. We truly want to grow, but my friends, we are beyond the time when people come to



church simply because we are available. Also, CUMC's Staff /Parish Relations Committee has increased staff support for children's ministry. This fall, we have brought Jane Reeb on board to work with Catherine Neal and the Children's Ministry team. This is so important as the number of young families worshiping at CUMC grows. Through our abundant generosity, there's no reason for CUMC to be in want. God has richly blessed us here. I can trust Him working through you to vibrantly support the work here. Thank you!

We have much to celebrate this fall as we *do* church at Christ Church. I want you to know:

- ♦ I'm happy to have Brent & Natalie Levy here. Brent is our Duke Divinity School Intern. He brings to us experience & a deepening faith; we will serve well together.
- At the end of October, I will be one of four people going to Russia with Mission

Get Connected, Show Abundant Generosity, and Serve Purposefully



CUMC's Missions Committee will kick off our gleaning project by participating in this year's Yam Jam on Saturday, October 18th from 8 am to 12 pm. We'll join hundreds of volunteers to harvest sweet potatoes at local farms. Last year, CUMC provided over 600 pounds of yams to food missions in Chatham and Orange counties. Fall is an ideal time to renew this effort because it's sweet potato season, and our state produces a bountiful crop. We'll glean what is left after the farmer has harvested sweet potatoes mechanically. Surprisingly, over 20% of all food produced in the U.S. annually never makes it to the table because farmers cannot harvest all crops profitably, despite their excellent food value.

Gleaning is a great family activity, and able-bodied volunteers of all ages can help, although adults must provide supervision for youth or children in our group. The day includes about 45 minutes of travel time (each way) and 2-3 hours on the farm. When we arrive at the farm (which most likely will be in southern Wake county), a trained Society of St. Andrew field supervisor will provide all the instructions and support we'll need.



Thank you from the Beyond our Borders (BOB) Team

This spring, during the annual fundraising campaign to support the needy children in Brazil and Nicaragua, 75 CUMC members contributed to specific projects in the two countries. Since its founding in 2002, BOB has provided significant support to a childcare center (crèche) in the Sao Jorge favela (slum) in Londrina, Brazil where 124 children are cared for every day while parents attempt to eke out a living. This year, we provided almost \$10,000 to provide an expansion of the Toddlers' Room, construction of two new bathrooms, & other important facility repairs.



BOB also supports the *Refugio* ministry in Londrina. It nurtures 200 at-risk children and adolescents and will expand to serve 250 kids by year's end. They provide activities such as Taekwondo, Jiu-Jitsu, dance, & music as ways to attract the children, and the staff helps them to develop a sense of self respect, learn healthy lifestyle habits, and see that there is hope. Refugio offers Sunday evening services that attract people from the streets, many of whom become involved and have their lives changed. This year, your abundant generosity helped BOB provide over \$2,000 for electrical work for the expanding facility.

Several Sundays throughout the year, the BOB team sells Nicaraguan "coffee for a cause" in Ascension Hall, & we are grateful for your support. The product is imported from Silvio

Mendez, a coffee grower who employs disadvantaged people & provides BOB with the highest quality coffee. Proceeds from these sales are now being directed back to some newer ministries in Nicaragua that provide support for poor children and their families. Please keep the BOB team in your prayers as they travel to Nicaragua on November 5 - 9.

Who are they? They're Christ Church men & women committed to helping the elderly and physically challenged remain independent and live safely in their

homes. Shepherd's Helpers will assist with the following maintenance items:


- Changing light bulbs
- Changing batteries & testing smoke/carbon monoxide detectors when the clocks change in spring and fall
- Changing/cleaning heating, ventilating, & air conditioning filters
- Checking/cleaning dryer exhaust vents
- Cleaning downspouts
- Winterizing (i.e., bringing in hoses, covering water/sprinkler spigots, etc.)
- Inspecting fire extinguishers
- Reviewing Slip & Fall Hazards (i.e., checking & repairing throw rug backing, burned out lights, etc.)
- Checking locks/deadbolts on doors/windows.

Shepherd's Helpers will also provide handyman **services** including hanging pictures, minor household repairs, set up & troubleshooting of electronic equipment (TVs, VCRs, music equipment, etc.), and plumbing repairs (minor clogs, running toilet, faucet repair, shower head replacement, etc.). For larger home improvement projects, they can also assist homeowners in negotiating with contractors.
